



Dear Confreres!

When was the last time you laughed out loud, giggled until your ribs hurt or your mouth ached? As children, we used to laugh hundreds of times a day, but as adults, life tends to be more serious and laughter more infrequent.

I hadn't previously considered God to have a sense of humor, but why wouldn't He? Much of our early Catholic formation focused on the pious nature of God who appeared as distant, serious, and perhaps cold, even vengeful and angry. A favorite scene from the Passion of Christ is when Mary pokes fun at Jesus's invention of the table, teasing that "it will never catch on". This dry sense of humor is an essential component of our lives and attributes positive humor to creative thinking and healthy relationships.

Humor, however, has not always been a laughing matter in the history of the Church. Although Ecclesiastes 3:4 tells us that there is "a time to weep, and a time to laugh," and although Sarah famously laughed when angelic visitors told her husband Abraham that she would bear a son within the year, most biblical references to laughter do not bring a smile to the face. When the Bible refers to laughter it is often the scornful laughter of a sinner reviling God.

Similarly, the Church Fathers give short shrift to laughter, seeing an inconsistency between the awareness of one's sins and the willingness to laugh. St. John Chrysostom suggests that weeping is preferable to laughing in this vale of tears. Yet the shared experience of every human is one of both weeping and laughing, of mourning and of dancing. The author of Proverbs reminds us that laughter and sadness abide together, one never far from the other. Together with the pain of separation from God, humanity's experience of God is replete with joy: the delight of Adam discovering Eve; the unbounded excitement of King David



dancing before the Ark of the Covenant; the happy leap of John the Baptist in the womb; heaven's elation at one repentant sinner; and, ultimately, the words we all long to hear, "Come, share your master's joy" in heaven, where "there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain" (Rv 21:4). A walk through the Bible shows that references to joy far outweigh the mention of sadness.

Though the Gospel writers note the tears of Jesus as He wept over Jerusalem, at the tomb of His friend Lazarus and certainly in Gethsemane's garden, no one can doubt the joy that permeated Jesus' public ministry. It's impossible not to picture Jesus and His apostles as joyful at the wedding feast in Cana. Joyful feasting was a common image of the Lord in His parables. Indeed, in His priestly prayer in John's Gospel, the Lord is clear about His mission: "That my joy might be in you and your joy might be complete" (Jn 15:11).

The power of a good laugh and the effect of connection it establishes cannot be underestimated. The same can be said for our attempts to share the good news of the Gospel with those we encounter. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us "where joylessness rules and humor dies, we may be certain that the Holy Spirit, the spirit of Jesus Christ, is not present".

Modern life has become increasingly complicated and it's believed that stress is the primary obstacle to laughter. In the midst of so much gloomy news, immersed as we are in many social and even personal emergencies, we have the power to spread peace and smiles. We are among the few who have the ability & opportunity to interact with all types of people, from different generations and cultural backgrounds. Laughter is an especially powerful tool for managing conflict and reducing tension when emotions are running high. Whether with community members, recipients, staff and others, we can learn to use humour to smooth over disagreements, lower everyone's stress level, and communicate in a way that builds up our relationships rather than breaking them down.

In his Apostolic letter to all consecrated people on the occasion of the year of consecrated life in 2014, Pope Francis mentioned that the old saying will always be true: "Where there are religious, there is joy'. We are called to know and show that God can fill our hearts to the brim with happiness; that we need not seek our happiness elsewhere; that the authentic fraternity found in our communities increases our joy; and that our total self-giving in service to the Church, to families and young people, to the elderly and the poor, brings us life-long personal fulfillment. None of us should be dour, discontented, and dissatisfied, for "a gloomy disciple is a disciple of gloom". Like everyone else, we have our troubles, our nights of the soul, our disappointments and infirmities, our experiences of slowing down as we grow older. But in all these things we should be able to discover 'perfect joy'".



We can apply to the consecrated life the words of Benedict XVI which Pope Francis cited in the Apostolic Exhortation Evangelii Gaudium: "It is not by proselytizing that the Church grows, but by attraction' (No. 14). The consecrated life will not flourish as a result of brilliant vocation programs, but because the young people we meet find us attractive because they see us as men and women who are happy! Similarly, the apostolic effectiveness of consecrated life does not depend on the efficiency of its methods. It depends on the eloquence of your lives, lives which radiate the joy and beauty of living the Gospel and following Christ to the full".



CATECHESIS ON

DRUG ABUSE AND ILLICIT TRAFFICKING



Dear brothers and sisters,

International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking was established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1987. This year's theme is The evidence is clear: Invest in prevention.

Saint John Paul II affirmed that "drug abuse impoverishes every community where it exists. It diminishes human strength and moral fiber. It undermines esteemed values. It destroys the will to live and to contribute to a better society". This drives the abuse of drugs and the use of drugs. At the same time, however, let us remember that each addict "has a unique personal story and must be listened to, understood, loved, and, insofar as possible, healed and purified... They continue to possess, more than ever, a dignity as children of God". [2] Everyone has dignity.

However, we cannot ignore the evil intentions and actions of drug dealers and traffickers. They are murderers! Pope Benedict XVI used stern words during a visit to a rehabilitation centre: "I therefore urge the drug dealers to reflect on the grave harm they are inflicting on countless young people and on adults from every level of society: God will call you to account for your deeds. Human dignity cannot be trampled upon in this way". And drugs trample on human dignity.

A reduction in drug addiction is not achieved by liberalizing drug use — this is a fantasy — as has been proposed, or already implemented, in some countries. Liberalize, and consumption increases. Having known so many tragic stories of drug addicts and their families, I am convinced that it is a moral duty to end the production and trafficking of these dangerous substances. How many traffickers of death there are — because drug traffickers are traffickers of death — driven by the logic of power and money at any cost! And this scourge, which produces violence and sows suffering and death, demands an act of courage from society as a whole. Drug production and trafficking also have a destructive impact on our common home. This has become increasingly evident, for example, in the Amazon basin.

Another key way to counter drug abuse and trafficking is through prevention, by promoting greater justice, educating young people in values that build personal and community life, accompanying those in need, and giving hope for the future.

I was able to visit several rehabilitation centres inspired by the Gospel, during my apostolic journeys in various dioceses and countries. They are a strong and hopeful witness to the commitment of priests, consecrated men and women, and lay people to put into practice the parable of the Good Samaritan. I am also comforted by the efforts undertaken by various bishops' conferences to promote just legislation and policies regarding the treatment of people addicted to drug use, and prevention to stop this scourge.

As an example, I point to the network of La Pastoral Latinoamericana de Acompañamiento y Prevención de Adicciones (plapa). The charter of this network recognizes that "addiction to alcohol, psychoactive substances, and other forms of addiction (pornography, new technologies, etc.) ... is a problem that affects us indiscriminately, beyond geographical, social, cultural, religious and age differences. Despite the differences ... we want to organize as a community: to share experiences, enthusiasm, difficulties".

I also mention the bishops of southern Africa, who convened a meeting in November 2023 on the theme, "Empowering youth as agents of peace and hope". Youth representatives who participated in the meeting described it as a "significant milestone geared towards a healthy and active youth throughout the region". They also made a promise: "We accept the role of being Ambassadors and Advocates who are going to fight against the use of substances. We plead with all young people to be empathetic to one another at all times".

Dear brothers and sisters, faced with the tragic situation of the drug addiction of millions of people around the world, faced with the scandal of the illicit production and trafficking of such drugs, "we cannot be indifferent. The Lord Jesus paused, drew near, and healed wounds. In the style of His closeness, we too are called to act, to pause before situations of fragility and pain, to know how to listen to the cry of loneliness and anguish, to stoop to lift up and bring back to life those who fall into the slavery of drugs". [6] And we pray for those criminals who give drugs to young people: they are criminals, they are murderers! Let us pray for their conversion.

As Christians and church communities, let us pray for this intention and renew our commitment to prayer and work against drugs. Thank you!

KOPAKKA: In today's fast-paced and highly competitive world, we often find ourselves carried by the demands of our minds. We prioritize logic, rationality, and intellectual pursuits, neglecting the importance of nurturing our hearts. Seventeen young children received the First Holy Communion from several substations. In the evening, many people came to participate in a Eucharistic Procession, a powerful spiritual experience that brought a beautiful celebratory day to a close.

All the elders were given a big salute, and their hosts bid them farewell with tumultuous claps.
